



# International Conference: Humanitarian Policy and Practice in a Changing Climate

1-2 December 2016, Felix Conference Centre, Oslo

The aim of this conference is to stimulate lively debate between the humanitarian and climate change communities. The world is facing two increasing challenges that are re-shaping development and well-being: first, huge humanitarian crises and resulting internal displacement and flows of refugees; and second, climate change. Both these challenges introduce new uncertainties and vulnerability patterns. New thinking is required about how we meet these related challenges. The conference aims to provide such thinking through dialogues between policy makers, practitioners and researchers, drawing on lessons from research carried out under the *Courting Catastrophe* project. A key question that the conference addresses is: Can humanitarian aid help drive transformational adaptation?
