What publications/communications should we produce/work on now?

General principle: communications should be accessible, but make recommendations where possible

- Research uptake meeting with decision-makers
 - Bringing together findings of all four projects
- Series of media articles on research findings
- Dialogue between research, humanitarian actors, and governments
- Develop audience-specific sets of recommendations
- Communicate findings on where climate change adaptation and mitigation fit into the humanitarian agenda
- Employ some of the games for communication to spread the lessons of the project

What publications/communications should we produce/work on now?

- Article: How does reducing risk free up the local/indigenous development of resilient pathways/livelihoods/etc.?
- Article: How does humanitarian aid produce transformation, whether or not it is intended?
 - What changes does DRR and response catalyze now?
 - Through what pathways are these changes/transformations catalyzed?
- Article: How to work within the constraints of humanitarian response to set up resilient livelihoods and adaptation pathways?
 - How does reducing risk free up the local/indigenous development of resilient pathways/livelihoods/etc.?
- Article: Challenging the resilience agenda
 - Clearly articulate how it can be used productively
 - Warn against its use to keep things the same
 - Warn against its use to make the vulnerable also the responsible

What are the key research questions to be addressed, and how?

- Is the worry about loss of power an underlying reason why we don't transfer lessons better?
- Does opening up space for contestation lead to transformational change?
- Does reducing risk create space for transformational change
- How do we better engage diverse understandings of root causes of vulnerability?
- How can we productively characterize the tension between long-term focus (new, political) and humanitarian principles (old, neutrality)
 - How can we productively think across long-term and short-term concerns?
- How can we design humanitarian response to avoid maladaptation?
- How can we build greater communication, understanding, and cooperation between humanitarian and development actors?
- How can we operationalize adaptation and mitigation in a manner that contributes to humanitarian/development accountability to affected populations?

How do the themes of this conference inform larger agendas?

- Efforts to avoid maladaptation
- Informing the respective roles of development and humanitarian actors in a changing climate
- Providing evidence for the efficacy of greater funding flexibility that enables work across humanitarian response and development
- Interaction with/informing the revision of Sphere standards to take long-term trajectories into account
- Challenging the resilience agenda
 - Clearly articulate how it can be used productively
 - Warn against its use to keep things the same
 - Warn against its use to make the vulnerable also the responsible
- Inform how humanitarian actors can contribute to the achievement of the SDGs
- Inform how climate agreement-related funds are disbursed, especially under national climate plans
