2222.2 SHoT the students health and welfare survey

Case responsible: The Student Board

The SHoT survey, which is responsible for the students 'health and well-being survey, will be conducted between 8th of February – 13th of March 2022. The purpose is to map how the students' health and well-being situation. This is Norway's largest student survey on this topic and is done every fourth year. The survey maps the prerequisites and framework conditions for students' learning at higher education institutions. The main purpose is to shed light on psychosocial conditions and how these affect the study situation and everyday life in general for students.

This is one of Norway's largest research projects on students' everyday lives, and it is incredibly important that as many people as possible respond in order to have a solid factual basis. These will be important figures that the students can use, to shed light on important topics in meetings with the universities, the University foundations for student life, and the municipalities.

2222.3 New strategy at NMBU

In January 2022, the work on developing a new university strategy for NMBU started up. NMBU's strategy amplifies the university's ambitions for the future, and the overall direction we want to work towards together. It is about seeing the big picture and about prioritizing and making choices for how NMBU will be able to realize our goals as an institution. It can be said that the strategy amplifies the university's long-term goals. This is the most important management document at NMBU.

The leader of AU is a member of the steering group (ULT) and the working group for the strategy. The Student Parliament and the student councils will be involved in the form of input gatherings and hearings in the coming semester. The Rector has decided that the new strategy will enter into force from 1.1.2023, and last until 2030, seen in connection with the UN's sustainability goals.

It shall be executed an electronic ballot election of the representatives of the Student Board, University Board and the Faculty Boards. The Urn election is tentative between 27th of April – 04th of May. Deadline for submitting your candidacy is 13th of April. Through a form that will be posted on the Student Democracy NMBUs' website.

The representatives in all the boards start at 01.07.2022 and poses the position for one (1) year.

The Student Board:

The Student Board is the Student Democracy's highest organ between Student Parliament meetings. They carry out the daily tasks of the Student Democracy and follow up on decisions made by the Student Parliament. The Student Board prepares case papers for the Student Parliament. The Student Board shall consists of 3 members: president and 2 board members, in full time (100%) positions. The members of AU are redeemed from their studies. The Student Board is a "collective" board, which means that all members are equal within the board. The Student Board also has an organizational secretary who works organizational and administratively.

The president has responsibility for strategic matters and represents NMBU students in the highest levels of leadership at NMBU, SiÅs Ås Municipality and other external offices. The president also has the responsibility for interacting with the media and the overarching responsibility of the organization. The other members allocate the areas and tasks between them, the area of responsibilities includes Study quality, learning environment, internationalization, student welfare, equality and diversity, research and sustainability at NMBU. The two members also work with the organizational matters in the organization and work closely with and follow up the other elected representatives in the Student Democracy to ensure good training and information flow within the organization.

We strongly recommend that the students that wants to run for the positions within the Student Board have knowledge of organizational work from before, as well as organizational and political experience. Furthermore, there is a strength to have cooperated closely in a team before and be a team player.

The University Board:

The University Board at NMBU is the highest decision-making organ at NMBU and consists of an external committee leader, and committee members that are both internal and external to NMBU.

The University Board works mostly with strategic matters, budgets, goal setting, reporting, and organizational development at an overarching level. The University Board has 7-8 meetings per year. Apart from this, members should meet up for other high-level meetings and seminars arranged by the "Kollegieforumet", which is a cooperation of boardmembmer for other universities and colleges; that concern the work of the board. The Committee members must also report their work to the Student Parliament and are obligated to be represented during parliament meetings.

132 From students, there should be two main representatives and two substitutes for the University Board.
133 In accordance with regulations there needs to be an equal gender representation, and it has been
134 decided that women are elected in the spring and men in the autumn.

135 We strongly recommend that students who wish to run for the University Board should have
136 experience in committees (SiÅs Board, institute committees, faculty committees, or similar) or board
137 work experience at a higher level (UFU/USU).

138 These positions are remunerated.

139

140 **The Faculty Boards:**

141 The Faculty Board is the faculties' highest decision making organ, and consists of scientific employees,
142 external board members and two student representatives. They work on cases of strategic character on
143 faculty level , and work with similar cases as the University Board. The Board has the overarching
144 responsibility locally, and their most important tasks are strategy, and action plans, as well as budget
145 and accounting. They have approximately four meetings a year that last for 6 hours each.

146 There are seven Faculty Board at NMBU, and they have similar practices with some local differences.
147 Just like the University Board there needs to be equal gender representation, and women are elected in
148 the spring and men in the autumn.

149 The board member are obligated to attend the Student Council meetings and report back to their
150 Faculty, and to inform the Student Council about decisions that are made in the Faculty Board.

151

152 The representatives in all the boards are elected by electronic vote (Student Elections), start July 1st
153 2022, and sit for a period of one year.

160 **2222.5 Orientation about the elimination of the Central Admissions** 161 **Committee**

162 *Case responsible: The Student Board*

164 Previous years the Student Parliament has appointed students for the Central Admissions Committee.
165 This practice will be altered from this year, as a consequence of a national alteration in the processes
166 regarding the case processing for separate assessment. According to this NMBU will change the practice
167 for case processing of applications with separate assessment and real competence assessments. This is
168 due to that the practice of the university shall coincide with the current practice at other institutions
169 that participates in admissions through "Samordna Opptak". The applications will be assessed after a
170 mutual, set rules from Samordna Opptak, and will no longer be assessed by a committee.

172 The administration of NMBU thanks the Student Parliament for its involvement, and for the efforts of
173 all the students that have been in the committee.

176 2223 Discussion Cases

177 2223.1 Kinnsåsen suggestions from the students at NMBU

178 *Case responsible: The Student Board*

179 **Purpose:**

180 Discuss what is important for students at NMBU related to the use of Kinnsåsen

181 **Background:**

182 Last autumn, Ås bought a leisure property by Årungen, named Kinnsåsen, from Tine SA in 2021 to
183 secure the area for the public and that all residents of Ås can enjoy this property. The municipality has
184 contacted AU where they ask for inputs regarding the operating model of Kinnsåsen, in order to map
185 what makes it attractive for NMBU students to use the property.

186 The cabin at Kinnsåsen was built in the 1960s and has 18 beds, kitchen facilities, toilet and shower. For
187 many years it has been possible to rent the cabin as a party place or for other events, which the
188 municipality still has a positive opinion about.

189 The property is regulated as a free area / park and is located within the natural environment
190 consideration zone in the area part of the municipal plan. The municipal director has sent an
191 application for state securing of the area. A state secured outdoor area is an outdoor area that is
192 considered important to the public. The purpose of state securing is to secure areas as publicly
193 accessible outdoor living areas for current and future generations.

194 Upcoming leader of the committee in the Municipality that will decide upon a operating model for the
195 project will come and listen to the debate and present the project. Her name is Emilie Åm.

214 2223.2 Dignified academic graduation at NMBU

215 *Case responsible: The Student Board*

216 **Purpose:**

217 Discuss what students want from a dignified academic graduation at NMBU

218 **Background:**

219 In accordance with the Action Plan 2022, AU has initiated work to establish dignified academic
220 graduation for all students who have obtained a degree (degree students) at NMBU. AU has been
221 working on the case for a couple of months, and a process has now been started in the central study
222 department (SA). We are now working on faculty-specific graduations. It has also been shown that all
223 faculties, except REALTEK, have some form of graduation ceremony. Nevertheless, AU has received
224 several feedbacks that the graduation ceremonies are not what the students may have envisioned as a
225 dignified graduation graduation.

228 Therefore, we want the Student Parliament and the Student Councils to provide clear guidelines for
229 what students need, and what lies in our understanding of *dignified academic graduation*.
230 It is important to note that one does not confuse this graduation with the traditional Ringfest, which is
231 held at Samfunnet.

253 **Background:**

254 Students' legal security is a generally basic and important principle for the education that takes place at
255 universities and colleges in Norway. It is desirable that the Student Parliament takes a position on this
256 resolution so that NMBU can become better at facilitating good processes and to give AU the
257 opportunity to follow up and contribute to this work. This is important and is based on experiences
258 from pandemics and feedback from class representatives and individual students. The resolution
259 therefore recommends using training and improvement of the user-friendliness.

271 **Purpose:**

272 To discuss a new regulation concerning substitutes in the Student Board
273

274 **Background:**

275 Based on a new structure for the Student Board (AU), where three people who work full time and have
276 been permitted from studies, AU is vulnerable if one of the members should, against all odds, resign
277 from position. According to current regulation, a new electronic urn election must be arranged if a
278 member resigns. It is time consuming and administratively difficult to arrange such a supplementary
279 election in the middle of a semester, especially if you have already lost a member. Furthermore, it will

also be catastrophic for the day-to-day operations if you lose a member concerning the areas of responsibility within the AU. Therefore, AU wants to add a paragraph to the regulations that specify and introduce substitutes to AU, and their function. This is to ensure continuity in AU if something should happen to one of the members and also have a guarantee that the organization will be more robust. The substitutes will be decided based on the candidates who run for the positions during the electronic urn election, where those with the highest number of votes (after those who win the election) get the substitute positions.

The substitutes will have a support function, and a sparring-partner for the members of the Student Board. The substitutes will not get permit from their studies but will be remunerated if they must step in for one of the members in certain situations. The substitutes will also be members of AU on equal terms, which means that they will be able to attend AU meetings, gain access to case documents, participate in kick-off seminars and class representatives training, and assist in the work to the extent that they can take over the position if something was going to happen.

Attachment 4: AU's answer to ISU, ESN and SAIH

Purpose: The purpose of this case paper is to discuss the implications of having a Norwegian language requirement to participate in the Student Board as proposed by AU. Furthermore, the purpose is to discuss the inclusion of international students in the student parliament, and the consequences of using Norwegian as the leading language. Based on this discussion we aim to bring forward both a resolution case and a statute change case for the next Student Parliament.

Background: In the first Student Parliament meeting of 2022, the discussion case about B2 Norwegian as a requirement for students to run for the Student Board (Arbeidsutvalget, AU) was on the agenda. Below are some of the arguments presented for implementing this language requirement and the counter-arguments against.

The leader and deputy leader of the Student Board argue in their letter (attachment 4) that requiring a B2 Norwegian level will not restrict diversity or limit international participation in the Student Democracy. Further, this language requirement is argued to make the student democracy more cost-effective because there are less practical constraints by not having to translate discussions and documents. It is also argued to make discussions more fruitful because students can express themselves in their first language. Finally, the language law has been used as an argument in favor of implementing this language requirement. This argument is being made on questionable grounds, and seems to be missing the purpose of the law.

327 However, the international student community at NMBU have highlighted that this change and the
328 above arguments are highly problematic (not least in the letter published by ISU NMBU, see attachment
329 3). We aim to deepen democracy at NMBU by fully including the international students in the Student
330 Democracy.

331 *Any Norwegian language requirement, including a B2 Language requirement, for the Student Board*
332 *members will exclude international students from full participation.* The Student Democracy is for all
333 students at NMBU. All students should have the same rights of participation in this organization. Setting
334 any Norwegian language requirement would go against the Student Democracy's own values of seeing
335 every single student at NMBU as an equal member of the community.

336 The leader and deputy leader of the Student Board argue that requiring a B2 Norwegian level will not
337 "restrict diversity" or limit international participation in the Student Democracy. This is wrong. Even
338 without this requirement, it is already difficult to fully participate, and international students have at
339 times felt unwelcome. The Norwegian language requirement would only worsen this issue by further
340 restricting access to, and participation in, the student democracy.

341 NMBU does not offer sufficient Norwegian language courses, meaning that international students who
342 want to learn the language must look elsewhere, travel, and pay a great deal of money. This means that
343 implementing a Norwegian language requirement would put a financial barrier on the participation of
344 non-Norwegian speaking students.

345 However, this is an issue of principle concerned with discrimination. NMBU is an international
346 university with full degree English speaking students and staff. International students are equal and full
347 members of the NMBU demos. It should not be required to know the Norwegian language in order to
348 participate in the Student Democracy at an *international* university. We would also like to point toward
349 the Norwegian anti-discriminatory law, which includes discrimination based on language[1].

350 *The leading language in the Student Parliament should be English.* This way all the students of NMBU can
351 actively and equally participate in the important discussions that take place. The 'translator solution'
352 that is in place now is not sufficient. This only allows non-Norwegian speakers to passively follow what
353 is being said, and limits to a great extent their possibility to engage actively and equally in the
354 discussions.

355 A valid point can be made that discussions in English might not be of the quality that is wished for, due
356 to non-native speakers feeling uncomfortable speaking in English and not having all the needed words
357 in their vocabulary. This is also true of many international students who do not have English as their
358 first language. English is the only language all students at NMBU have in common and that is the most
359 important consideration.

360 In the original discussion case, a B2 Norwegian level is said to be sufficient for a work environment in
361 the Student Board, in this case a B2 English level should be sufficient for working in the Student
362 Parliament. The extra effort one may need to put in is heavily outweighed by the inclusiveness and
363 democracy that will come from having English as the leading language.

364 The Student Parliament cannot call itself a democracy (folkestyre) while excluding an entire category of
365 students from active participation from the outset. Therefore, it is worth considering whether English
366 should be the leading language in order to have a full and inclusive Student Parliament.

367 **Debate points / points for discussion:**

- 368 - Should all students have the possibility of running for positions in the Student Democracy,
369 including for the Student Board, the Student Parliament, and positions within the Student
370 Councils of each faculty?

- Should the leading language of the Student Parliament be English to ensure international inclusion in NMBU's democracy?
- What are the negative consequences of having a Norwegian language requirement for the Student Board? How does this impact international students' chances of participating in the Student Board and being represented and heard in the Student Democracy?

2224.1 Adjustments of the statutes of the student democracy

Case responsible: The Student Board

Attachment 5: New and old regulations. The changes are marked.

Purpose:

Approve amendments of the Statutes for the Student Democracy

Background:

AU believes it is appropriate to change several of the regulations of the Student Democracy at the Norwegian University of Life Sciences in accordance with other policies we stand for. Below are AU's reasons for the changes.

AMENDMENT OF REGULATION 1 - § 5-2 Electronic urn election a):

We want to stipulate in the regulations a requirement specification related to working language for candidates who apply to the Student Parliament's Student Board to ensure qualified candidates. This is based on an operational, day-to-day operational role, such as AU's function at NMBU, it is important that the candidates can use Norwegian as a working language. Working in the Student Parliament's Student Board is a full-time job, where much of the job is to navigate the NMBU system and administration, sit in over 20 regular Norwegian-speaking meetings, and relate to an organizational everyday life that takes place in Norwegian. From ST1, we have removed the requirements specification B2 level for candidates, because this can be costly for an individual student. The most important thing for AU is that the students who apply are aware of what they are to expect.

This will also streamline AU's use of the Student Parliament's money, as AU has the opportunity to accomplish as much as possible during the year they are elected. From experience, it takes a long time to get acquainted with the AU position itself, and with language as a barrier, it has been even more challenging for the members as individuals. NMBU operates based on a centrally adopted language policy, where Norwegian is the working language, which means that all case documents, case processing and meetings will take place primarily in Norwegian. It is important that AU can navigate the NMBU system and make itself sufficiently understood.

Nevertheless, it is not necessary to be fluent in Norwegian both orally and in writing to do a good job in an AU position. We want to emphasize that this will not be a restriction of diversity or real democracy, but a specification of the types of qualities it is important to have for students in such positions of trust. This specification of Norwegian as a working language in AU will not prevent students from participating in student democracy in general, only these three full-time jobs.

421 **AMENDMENT OF REGULATION 2 - § 5-2 Electronic urn election b):**

422 AU does not want the Student Democracy to be absolute in their opinion that there are only two
423 genders. Furthermore, we want to make our own election regulations flexible enough if a third legal
424 gender is introduced in Norway. Therefore, we want the additional line, which is marked green in the
425 appendix as a formulation and clarification. This is to ensure diversity and representation, without
426 excluding.

427
428 **AMENDMENT OF REGULATION 3 - § 5-2 Electronic urn election c):**

429 We want to make § 5-2 Electronic urn election b) and § 5-2 Electronic urn election c) more similar in
430 wording and form.

431
432 **AMENDMENT OF REGULATION 4 §8-1-2 Program of principles:**

433 Change in accordance with the change in the principle programme's treatment in Årshjulet, by
434 specifying the 5-year treatment cycle.

435
436 **AMENDMENT OF REGULATIONS 5 §8-1-3 Political documents:**

437 We want to specify the term political documents in the Student Democracy and will therefore use it as a
438 collective term. Therefore, we propose to divide the political documents more systematically into
439 political platforms, regulations, and other documents.

440
441
442 **Recommendation:**

443 AU recommends that the amendments to the Statutes of the Student Democracy are approved with one
444 taking dissent.

445
446 **Proposed Decision:**

447 The Student Parliament approves the amendments to the Statutes of Student Democracy

448
449 The Student Board presented the case.

450 The Student Parliament voted over postponing the first amendment due to lack of time. There
451 are now 24 representatives eligible to vote.

452 For: 1

453 Against: 22

798 knowledge from children and information about children's basic procedural rights according to the UN
Convention on the Rights of the Child. AU and NMBU have also done the same. After a dialogue with the

799 Change Factory, we believe there is a need for the Student Parliament at NMBU to adopt a policy in
800 which we encourage the university to become a child rights university.
801
802 At NMBU we are educating many students who will work with children in the future.
803 The educations contain a number of subject literature that is relevant for when the students get out in
804 practice and starts a new job. However, literature that the educations do not contain are concrete
805 descriptions of children's fundamental rights according to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child,
806 guidance for how to meet children, and how to take care of them in practice. These are rights that
807 describe how adults should go forward and cooperate with children, in all actions and decisions that
808 concern them. This should help ensure that it is done in the best interests of the child. The rights also
809 contribute to better legal certainty
810 for children and better highlighted cases.
811
812 Several of the educations at NMBU do not have knowledge directly from children in the curriculum.
813 These are systematically obtained experiences and advice from children, concerning the various
814 systems made for them. This applies to e.g. kindergarten, school, mental health services, leisure
815 activities, child welfare, police and the judiciary. AU believes this should be worked actively into all
816 relevant fields of study at NMBU.
817

854 time, these job percentages were distributed over 6 students, who often worked beyond normal
855 working hours. We believe that it is now time to add adequate resources to student democracy, so that
856 AU can work for students' issues in a better way.
857 The Student Parliament at NMBU has two functions, both as the Student Parliament / Studentting and
858 as the Welfare Parliament. This makes us different from many other student democracies, and we now
859 believe that more must be done with welfare policy issues. This is also an input we often receive.

890 **Students' legal security**

891 *Approved at Student Parliament x, xx.xx.xxxx*

892 Cases where students feel unfairly treated appear now and then. It can be about administrative
893 decisions, examination procedures, censorship, assessment system and teaching. NMBU should aim for
894 a zero vision for this. All rules are in NMBU's regulations or are authorized there. Unfortunately, the
895 regulations are both difficult to find and appears as confusing. It is also unreasonable to demand that
896 individual students should be able to interpret heavy legal texts on their own. There is a great need for
897 making the laws and regulations that apply to NMBU's students available to ensure students' legal
898 security. This must also happen through increased competence and training.

899 During the corona pandemic, many students noticed the importance of predictability in their studies.
900 When an exam is moved all sudden, it has a big impact on our everyday lives. Maybe that means you
901 must drop a block course or take twice as many credits as planned? Hopefully, temporary corona
902 regulations will be history after 2022 but we must learn from what has happened. For example, we
903 have learned that practicing for an approved / not approved exam is something completely different
904 than practicing for an exam with an exam grade. In addition, we have learned that it was not always
905 given sufficient information about what it took to pass the exam. The regulations of the NMBU follow
906 the legal method, which means that they are formulated in a way that can be a bit difficult to
907 understand. It is therefore not necessarily the regulations themselves that are the source of the
908 problems. Much can be done with the routines at NMBU to improve legal certainty. An example of this
909 could be to include training on the democratic processes at NMBU as a common compulsory course.
910 Education as well as proper educating must be followed up.
911 Having knowledge of the rules that affect your everyday should not be a special skill only some students
912 have. Of course, not all students need to have a full overview of all the regulations at NMBU, but work
913 must be done to ensure that everyone has a general knowledge of them and where you can find them.
914 Although some of the responsibility for knowing the regulations must be given to the students, a
915 significant part must also be given to the university. Course responsible people, lecturers, program
916 councils, supervisors, etc. are in a position where one single resolution they make can have a great
917 impact on the students' everyday lives and negatively affect the study progression. Therefore, efforts
918 should be made to train both students and staff so that students will get better legal security.
919

920 **The Student Parliament at NMBU demands that:**

- 921 • NMBU shall, in collaboration with the Student Board, work to ensure that the rules in NMBU's
- 922 regulations are clear and easy for students to find and understand.
- 923 • The university will work to ensure that employees gain better knowledge of NMBU's regulations.
- 924 • NMBU shall systematically review its routines so that students will have legal certainty at all levels.
- 925 • Efforts will be made to increase transparency around the processes that results in a resolution.
- 926 • In cases that have an impact on the students' everyday life and / or study progression, the students
- 927 must always be given a justified explanation.
- 928 • Students must have very good predictability for both the examination and the assessment system.
- 929 • The information presented about NMBU's regulations will be more user-friendly, focusing on the
- 930 students.
- 931 • Efforts will be made to ensure that employees and students receive good training in democracy and
- 932 rights at NMBU.

§ 4-1 Powers and Functions

The Student Board (AU) carries out the Student Parliament's daily operations and represents the Student Parliament between meetings. AU can make decisions in urgent cases, cases that are delegated due to earlier decisions in the Student Parliament, and appoint people to non-decision making committees. AU makes proposals in all cases handled by the Student Parliament, with the exception of Elections.

§ 4-2 Composition

The Student Parliament's Student Board shall consist of the following members:

- President
- Student Board member
- Student Board member.

~~The members of the Student Board are redeemed from their studies.~~ The

Student Board constitutes their areas of responsibility internally. Working

time and election periods are regulated according to functions

§ 4-3 Decision Ability and Voting Ties

The Student Board can make valid decisions when at least four members are in attendance. With avoting tie in the Student Board, the president has a double vote

§ 4-4 Substitutes

~~The substitutes in the Student Board is constituted from the election protocol. The candidates with the highest number of votes next to the winners of the election automatically becomes substitutes. The president has one (1) substitute and the members have one(1) substitute each. You cannot be a member of The Student Board and be a substitute in the Student Board at the same time. The substitutes will not be redeemed from their studies, but are a full-flegded members of the Student Board.~~

Proposed changes in a chapter:

Chapter 5: Elections and Appointments

§ 5-1 Eligibility for the Student Democracy

The overarching rule is that all Students at NMBU with a valid semester registration can run forpositions in the Student Democracy. This applies unless otherwise specified.

§ 5-2 Electronic Ballot Elections

a) Election of the Student Board

The Student Parliament's Student Board are elected through Electronic Ballot Voting, where all students with a valid semester registration have the right to vote. The elections take place in Aprilevery year. They hold their position for 1 year, between 1.7. until 30.6.

981 b) Election to the University Board

982 Two student representatives are elected, one of each gender, with a deputy. They are chosen
983 through an electronic ballot vote, where all students with a valid semester registration have the
984 right to vote. The election takes place every year in April/May for female representatives, and in
985 November for male representatives. They hold the position for one year, from 01.07 to 30.06 for the
986 spring election, and 01.01-31.12 for the fall election.

988 c) Elections to the Faculty Board

989 Student Representatives are chosen through electronic ballot voting, where all students with a valid
990 semester registration have the right to vote within their respective faculties. They hold the position
991 for one year, from 01.01-31.12 for male representatives (elected in November) and 01.07-30.06 for
992 female representatives (elected in April/May).

995 **§ 5-3 Other elections and appointments conducted in the Student Parliament**

996 The Student Parliament elects student representatives to central positions and committees at
997 NMBU, to individual committees and to the board for student welfare organization. All elections are
998 done by writing. In the case that only one candidate is running, they can be elected by acclamation,
999 unless at least one representative wishes to have a written voting process.

1000
1001 With a tie in voting between two candidates, a new voting round will be held. With a continued tie
1002 after a new voting round, the decision will be made according to the proposed resolution. If there is
1003 no suggestion made the decision will be made by drawing lots. Those chosen in this paragraph have
1004 minute requirements to the Student Parliament.

1006 Student Representatives that are not connected to the Student Welfare Organization in Ås (SiÅs)
1007 do not have voting rights for the representatives of The SiÅs Board.

1009 **§ 5-4 Supplementary Elections**

1026 To whom it may concern,

1027 I am writing this open letter today on behalf of NMBU's International Student Union (ISU) and with the
1028 support of ESN and SAIH. It has come to our attention that the Student Board of NMBU plans to
1029 introduce a requirement that all future applicants to the board be proficient in the Norwegian
1030 language. This discussion case was opened at the first student parliament of 2022, 7th March 2022,
1031 with case number 2214.1.

1032 The Student Board have stated that this requirement will ensure qualified candidates and emphasizes
1033 that it will not be a restriction of diversity. However, ISU holds differing opinions and believes this
1034 move will be detrimental to the current and past goals of all international organisations within NMBU
1035 and the credibility of the student board with regard to integration of international students.

1036 NMBU has a comprehensive international environment and welcomes international students from all
1037 over the world. Approximately 12% of current students at the university have travelled from abroad,
1038 while 8% of staff have foreign citizenship. Moreover, 43% of study programmes at NMBU are in
1039 English and over half (56%) of the masters' degree students are international students. These figures
1040 alone are testament to the negative effects this adjustment to the statutes of the student democracy
1041 will have on internationalisation and diversity within the student board.

1042 We believe that this case is a backwards step for the internationalization of the university and that
1043 there should be no exclusion for non-Norwegian speakers. Moreover, we hold that future international
1044 officers on the student board should have great experience of what it means to be an international
1045 student and the difficulties that come with that. International students already feel left aside in a
1046 foreign country and introducing a requirement to be proficient in Norwegian to run for positions
1047 within the student board will exclude them even more from university life. Having candidates from
1048 many different backgrounds enriches diversity and democracy on campus.

Hello, ISU, ESN, SAIH and all students at NMBU

First of all the student board want to thank you for participating in this debate, and voicing your opinions. It is through discussion and debate we get everyone's viewpoint, and really can see the positive effect of internationalization and inclusion. Together we hope to continue this work.

To clarify, if anyone should be uncertain about some facts on the case, it will in the end be the Student Parliament who will decide on this case, along with a lot of other changes to the Student Parliament by-laws. It is true that we will send a suggestion to them based on the discussion-case mentioned, number 2214.1. The suggestion and case-papers for the Student Parliament will be made public Thursday 24th of February.

Now it is important to note that we are bound by some rules and regulations that we have no direct control over. The main issue here is the Norwegian language law (commonly referred to in Norwegian as "Språklova"), and the language political document of NMBU. The combination of these binding documents results in a vast amount of documents only being available in Norwegian, which in turn results in some discussions being more fruitful and efficient in Norwegian. This might at first glance seem like a minor issue, and in most cases it is. The exception is when one is elected to work fulltime in the position as Student Board member or leader. Only once in the history of student democracy have an English-speaking student managed this. The dedication, motivation, accommodation and work required is tremendous. The Student Board is working for the 6750 students attending NMBU. The workload of this is huge, even for students fluent in Norwegian.

For future Student Boards to be able to focus on all the things that can be done to improve student life we feel this change is necessary. We have no intention of barring the door for international students to participate in the Student Democracy, in the student life or the student culture. It simply a language requirement, which is common in a workplace environment. We do believe that this will not restrict diversity more than it will benefit all students. The voices and opinions of international students will still be heard in meetings with you, the international organisations at NMBU. It will be heard from the student representatives in the Student Parliament, from representatives in the Student Councils. And it will be listened to by the international responsible and all other members of the Student Board.

1315 **Purpose of the instruction:**

1316 This instruction provides an overall insight into the student councils' purpose, function and

1322 **The Student Council's vision:**

1323 The Student Council's primary task is to organize the class representatives at the faculty level and
1324 safeguard the students' rights and interests at the faculty. The Student Council is an arena for
1325 communication and cooperation between class representatives in various councils / committees and
1326 across fields of study. The Student Council shall contribute to good communication between the
1327 students and staff at its faculty.

1329 **The Student Council's main tasks:**

- 1330 • Be an arena for discussion about local and central issues concerning the students at the faculty.
- 1331 • To promote the students' interests in all relevant councils and committees at the faculty.
- 1332 • All members of the student council are responsible for informing the student council about
- 1333 important matters that are discussed in their councils / committees if there is no exemption from
- 1334 the duty of confidentiality.
- 1335 • Discuss issues that are promoted by the students at the faculty and promote them in the relevant
- 1336 council / committee.
- 1337 • Communicate important information about current issues to the students at the faculty.
- 1338 • The student councils will discuss student affairs and stay up to date on what is happening in the
- 1339 Student Democracy in general.
- 1340 • In collaboration with the Student Parliament's Student Board (AU), ensure that new class
- 1341 representatives are introduced to work tasks and current issues in their new position.
- 1342
- 1343 • The Student Council and AU are responsible for ensuring that all members of the Student Council
- 1344 agree with these instructions, as well as other documents that are central to the performance of
- 1345 their duties.
- 1346 • The Student Council shall follow up the adopted Annual Wheel and Date Plan for the Student
- 1347 Parliament and set up its activities based on these.
- 1348
- 1349 • Conduct a faculty general meeting once a semester.
- 1349
- 1350 • The Student Council shall contribute to the Student Council in particular, and the Student
- 1350 Democracy in general being visible on campus, especially during the buddy week.
- 1351
- 1352 • The Student Council shall also be a social meeting place and is responsible for stimulating
- 1353 academic community for students at the faculty. Where relevant, the student council has the overall
- 1353 responsibility for academic homes.

- 1354 **Composition of the Student Council:**
- 1355 • **President.** Elected for 1 year at the autumn meeting.
- 1356 • **Vice-president.** Elected for 1 year at the spring general meeting.
- 1357 • **Student Parliament representatives.** Elected for 1 year at the autumn meeting.
- 1358 • **Faculty board representatives.** Elected for 1 year in electronic urn election in the autumn (male)
1359 and spring (female).
- 1360 • Student representatives in the faculty's research committee. Elected for 1 year at a general meeting.
- 1361 • Student representatives in the faculty's teaching committee / study committee. Elected for 1 year at a
1362 general meeting
- 1363 • Student representatives in the faculty's recommendation committee. Elected for 1 year at a general
1364 meeting
- 1365 • Student representatives in the faculty's recruitment committee. Elected for 1 year at a general
1366 meeting
- 1367 • **Program Council representatives.** How they are chosen and how long they sit varies from faculty to
1368 faculty.
- 1369 • **Class representatives** from all classes. Elected in principle for the entire study program at STUD100
1370 in the August block. Possibly other representatives, for example from the programme associations or
1371 temporary working groups.
- 1372 **Tasks for all members of the student council:**
- 1373 All members of the student council:
- 1374 • Has a duty to attend student council meetings and in the respective council / committee and is
1375 responsible for calling in substitutes if they are unable to attend.
- 1376 • Must attend prepared for the meetings - read the case documents and possibly submit your own cases
1377 in advance.
- 1378 • Promote relevant issues in its council / committee.
- 1379 • Promote relevant issues from its council / committee in the student council.
- 1380 • Is a person of trust to whom the students at the faculty can contact regarding cases.
- 1381 • Must be up to date regarding the extent to which you are under a duty of confidentiality in your

- 1385 President:
- 1386 • Has overall strategic responsibility.
- 1387 • Follows up the other class representatives

- 1389 • Prepares and the chairman of the student councils.
- 1390 • Attends student council dinners.
- 1391 • Follow up the mailbox.
- 1392 • Arranges a general meeting in consultation with the student council.
- 1393 • Member of the Student Management Team (SLT).
- 1394 • Has a regular dialogue with the faculty management
- 1395 • More specific information in “Instructions for the president and vice-president of the student council”.
- 1396
- 1397 Vice-president:
- 1398 • Has overall administrative responsibility.
- 1399 • Take the minutes during the student council meetings and makes the minutes available after the
- 1400 meetings.
- 1401 • Vice-president convenes meetings and writes minutes.
- 1402 • Update contact lists and make minutes and notices available on the Student Council's communication
- 1403 platform. The contact information shall be passed on to the faculty's administration.
- 1404 • Order rooms, food and drinks for the student council meetings.
- 1405 • Overall responsibility for the promotion of the Student Council. Sits in the working group for the
- 1406 promotion of Student Democracy.
- 1407 • More specific information in “Instructions for the president and vice-president of the student council”.
- 1408 Student Parliament representatives
- 1409 • Has a duty to attend student meetings (3 meetings per semester) and meets as a representative from
- 1410 his faculty.
- 1411 • To promote the Student Council's opinions at the Student Parliament.
- 1412 • Responsible for student affairs at the Student Council. It is encouraged that the ST representatives are
- 1413 the case presenters on these cases.
- 1414 • Attend the student council dinner
- 1415 • Participates in the Kickoff Conference in January-February.
- 1416 Faculty Board Representatives (FS) - *The Faculty Board is the faculty's highest organ. The faculty board is*
- 1417 *responsible for setting overall goals, priorities and strategies for the faculty.*
- 1418 • Has a duty to attend faculty board meetings (2 meetings per semester). Is responsible for calling in a
- 1419 substitute if they cannot attend.
- 1420 Promotes students' opinions and views on issues that are discussed in FS.

- 1421 • Informs the student council about important matters that are not covered by confidentiality.
- 1422
- 1423 Representatives in the Faculty's study committee / teaching committee (SU / UU)
- 1424 • Has a duty to attend meetings in SU / UU (approx. 3-5 meetings in the semester). Is responsible for
1425 calling in a substitute if they cannot attend.
- 1426 Promotes students' opinions and views on matters dealt with in (SU / UU).
- 1427 • Addresses issues in SU that are raised in the student council or by individual students.
- 1428 • Has a duty to report to the student council.
- 1429
- 1430 Representatives in the Faculty's Research Committee (FU)
- 1431 • Has a duty to attend meetings in FU (approx. 3-5 meetings in the semester). Is responsible for calling
1432 in a substitute if they cannot attend.
- 1433 • Promotes students' opinions and views on issues that are dealt with in FU.
- 1434 • Addresses issues in FU that are raised in the student council or by individual students.
- 1435 • Has a duty to report to the student council.
- 1436
- 1437 Representatives in the Faculty's recommendation committee - *The recommendation committee*
1438 *evaluates applicants for scientific positions. They review applications, conduct interviews and trial*
1439 *lectures, before sending a recommendation on the best candidate (s) to the recruitment committee.*
- 1440 • Has a duty to attend the recommendation committee. The number of meetings varies as needed. Is
1441 responsible for calling in a substitute.
- 1442 • Attends meetings, interviews and trial lectures on equal terms with the other members of the
1443 recommendation committee.
- 1444 • Informs the student council about important events that are not covered by confidentiality.
- 1445
- 1446 Representatives in the recruitment committee - *The recruitment committee hires for scientific positions*
1447 *on the recommendation of the nomination committee.*
- 1448 • Has a duty to attend the recruitment committee. The number of meetings varies as needed. Is
1449 responsible for calling in a substitute if needed.
- 1450 • Participates in discussions and decisions related to appointments to scientific positions, based on the
1451 recommendations from the recommendation committee.
- 1452 • Informs the student council about important events that are not covered by confidentiality.
- 1453
- 1454 Representatives in the program council - *The program council evaluates and further develops the various*
1455 *study programs. There is one program council per study program.*

- 1456
- 1457 • Has a duty to attend the program council. The number of meetings varies as needed. Is responsible for
- 1458 calling in a substitute.
- 1459 • Is responsible for collecting input for improvements to courses and study programs.
- 1460 • Has a duty to report to the Student Council.
- 1461
- 1462
- 1463 Class representative
- 1464 • The main task is to convey important information from the Student Council to its class, and from the
- 1465 class to the Student Council. It can be done in chats, at Cava, by email or in class meetings.
- 1466 • Is a contact person for the students in their class and brings matters forward to the Student Council.
- 1467 • Is an important link between the student council and the students at the faculty.

Discussion case - NMBU as a Children's Rights university

Knowledge from children

All children in Norway have knowledge about their experience from the system or service they are in and how they work. The Changefactory conducts systematic surveys for children from all over Norway. They collect experiences and advice from children about their meeting with kindergartens, schools, emergency services and the legal system. The answers that are repeated are summarized and collected as knowledge directly from children. The goal is that this knowledge is included when the systems are further developed, so that the systems made for children will be experienced as safe and useful for them. Knowledge from children contains descriptions of how kindergarten teachers, teachers, health workers, child welfare workers and others who meet children should be, for children to get sufficient learning and get good help. This knowledge describes how adults must act to make it safe for the children to talk openly about important things. The perspectives presented are based solely on experiences and advice from children who are in various systems and services.

The Convention on the Rights of the Child states that all children have four basic rights when you meet them, when actions are to be taken and decisions are made that will affect them.

- that the **best interests of the child** should be a fundamental consideration in all actions that affect children (BK article 3, Constitution §104),
- that the child has the **right to express himself/herself freely** about matters that affect the child (BK article 12, Constitution § 104)
- that the child has the **right to get information** in connection with the child having the right to express himself or herself (BK Article 12),
- and that the child has the right to privacy (BK article 16, The European Human Rights Convention (ECHR) Article 8, Constitution § 102).

The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child contains some basic procedural rights that apply to everyone under the age of 18. By systematically teaching students how to use these rights in practice can have great significance in the lives of many children. The rights protect children's legal certainty, and studies show that if the rights are followed in all circumstances that affects a child, the trust of the adults working in the services is maintained. This will not only contribute to the children gained confidence in the professionals of the future, but also give the students concrete tools they can use when they start working. Then we ensure that they follow Norwegian law. For the future students that will work with children, to be well equipped to meet this community group in their working life, it is crucial that NMBU systematically trains their students in what children themselves believe are good ways to be met in all systems and services which is made for them.

The Student Parliament at NMBU believes that:

- NMBU will become a children's rights university with focus on children's basic procedural rights according to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, in all fields of study that educate students to work with children.
- NMBU shall introduce knowledge directly from children in the curriculum in all relevant fields of study.

2227.10 Attachment 10 Extended Action Plan for 2022

Plan of Action 2022

Approved at Student Parliament x, xx.xx.xxxx

This is the action plan for student democracy. It has been adopted by the Student Parliament and states what is desirable for the organization to prioritize working with in the coming year. It is assumed that continuous assessments are always made and there is an understanding that both needs can change and that unforeseen things can arise. In addition to the measures in the action plan, the daily operation of student democracy must be ensured. In the annual report from the Student Board, the various points in the action plan must be commented on so that Student Parliament is informed about where the process is and what assessments have been made. The action plan shall not contain policy but shall contain measures to increase impact of the Student Parliament's policy. The action plan is linked to the long-term strategy that applies from 2021-2023.

Internationalization

- Ensure that all international exchange students receive a dignified welcome at NMBU. In collaboration with SiT, Fadderuka, ISU, and ESN, work will be done to increase communication, information flow and integration at the start of studies.
- Work to ensure that foreign-language international students are included in all councils and committees at NMBU.
- Collaborate with SAIH on a campaign to highlight international issues and the creation of a new subject around Scholars at Risk.
- A workshop will be arranged with the Student Society and UKA to share good inclusion measures that can be used for inclusive events, and to build a supportive cross-culture in the student community.

Environment

- Work to improve the traffic situation in Ås, primarily campus, with a focus on improved public transport, cyclists, and safety for pedestrians.
- The Student Democracy will challenge the principal to ask questions about a climate neutral NMBU for all students and employees.
- Be visible and contributing to issues concerning NMBU as a sustainability university and ensure that the Environmental Action Plan is followed up.
- Work to make SiÅs more sustainable, with a focus on better systems for reusing furniture

Student life

- The Student Board shall work to ensure that all students who complete a degree at NMBU receive a dignified academic completion.
- Meetings will be regularly arranged for association leaders where topics such as inclusion, role understanding and responsibility are addressed, and experiences are exchanged.
- The Student Democracy will work to ensure that NMBU retains the mentoring settlement, which supports new students beyond the Buddy Week.
- The Student Democracy must work for good physical and mental health services for all students in Ås.
- In collaboration with SiÅs work to ensure that students gain a better understanding of what SiÅs is, what they do and how they are organized.
- Work for a good two-way integration of the VET students at campus Ås.
- The Student Democracy will follow up the position of Buddy General in its new form.
- Develop a mandate for the use of room UU117, the Thorvald and Thora room, as a common room for all students at NMBU.
- Work against loneliness and exclusion - further development of intranet pages for students.

Study quality

- The Student Democracy shall follow up the action plan for universal design and psychosocial study environment.
- Efforts will be made to create a pilot for special courses for union representatives (formerly AOS234).
- Efforts will be made to merit teachers at NMBU, where the students will be represented in the work.
- The Student Board will work for increased focus on interdisciplinarity and sustainability, including the establishment of interdisciplinary common subjects.
- A document for digitization at NMBU must be investigated.

The Student Democracy

- The working committee shall work to formalize and remunerate Student Council presidents, Student Council vice presidents as well as other committees at faculty level.
- The Student Board will work to get a fourth working committee member, in order to better cover responsibility for student welfare, follow-up and coordination with SiÅs, organizational follow-up, collaboration with associations and class representatives.
- Work to improve Student Democracy at the organizational level, so that there can be increased contact between class representatives and other members of the organization.
- Training of newly elected representatives shall be arranged after the general meetings each semester, under the auspices of the student councils.
- A regular exchange of experience between the Student Councils shall be maintained, including continuing the ?(hva star det på norsk her) , the Student Leadership Group.
- The Student Board shall arrange regular seminars with students in the University Board and in the Faculty Boards.
- During the Student Election each semester, a marketing campaign will be carried out with the aim of getting as many students as possible to use their right to vote.
- The Student Board shall co-operate with other student democracies on national student policy issues.
- The Student Board shall respond to relevant hearings that affect the University and College sector.
- The Student Parliament and the Student Councils shall be represented where the students are located and participate in relevant events under the auspices of Samfunnet and Fadderuka, such as debates and rebus.
- Social events must be arranged regularly for the Student Parliament.
- The marketing of the Student Democracy and the Student Parliament will be increased, and there will be a focus on building a common identity and brand.

Research and innovation

- Make research groups and the academic environments at NMBU visible to students, primarily the Sustainability Arenas.
- Efforts will be made to make student innovation infrastructures visible and to improve resources related to research on campus.
- The Student Board will focus on increased working life relevance, nearby practical educations and student active research related to relevant councils and committees

Chapter 1: Purpose and Scope

§ 1-1 Purpose

The Student Democracy at NMBU has the purpose of protecting the students' interests and bringing forward their inputs.

§ 1-2 Scope

1654

These statutes apply to all organs of the Student Democracy at NMBU and are constructed in accordance with national laws and regulations. Instructions taken up in chapter 8 cannot go against these statutes.

1658

Chapter 2: Structure of the Student Democracy at NMBU

1659

§ 2-1 At a Central Level

1660

The highest democratic organ in the Student Democracy at NMBU is the Student Parliament. The daily operations of the Student Parliament are carried out by the Student Parliament's Student Board.

1662

1663

§ 2-2 At a Faculty Level

1664

At the Faculty level, the Student Democracy consists of Student Councils. Student Councils are constructed of the committees and positions that come from the model for Student Councils approved of at Student Parliament 6 on 14.11.2016.

1667

1668

The Faculty general assembly is the highest student democracy organ at a faculty level. Between faculty general assemblies the student councils stand for the daily operations and representations of the faculty's student democracy.

1671

1672

The Student Council at Campus Adamstuen is delegated the power of communication and representation over the Welfare Committee in Oslo and Akershus.

1674

1675

Chapter 3: The Student Parliament

1676

§ 3-1 Powers and Functions

1677

The Student Parliament represents all students at NMBU, and decisions made in the Student Parliament are made on the behalf of all students. The Student Parliament has the responsibility to inform about decisions made. Closing of the meeting must follow the provisions in §3-6.

1679

1680 **§ 3-2 Construction**
1681 The Faculties at NMBU are constituents of the Student Parliament. The Student Parliament consists of
1682 25 representatives. These representatives are distributed according to the democracy model approved
1683 of at Student Parliament 6 in 2016.

1684 The division method for the mandatory seat allocation follows this formula:

1685

1689 V= Number of students at the faculty

1690 S= Number of student representatives the faculty is allocated

1691
1692 Updated number of students can be found in the Database for Statistics on Higher Education (DBH)
1693 every fall. The average of the number of students for the spring semester and fall semester make up the
1694 basis for the following year's representative distribution in the Student Parliament.

1695
1696 This calculation basis is presented for orientation before the fall faculty general assemblies.

1697
1698 **§ 3-3 Constituting**

1699 The Student Parliament representatives are elected for one year at the time. One should aim for the
1700 constituent Student Parliament to be held between the fall faculty general assemblies and the new year.

1701
1702 **§ 3-4 Meetings and Summoning**

1703 The Student Parliament must hold at least 3 meetings per semester. The Student Board is responsible
1704 for summoning the Student Parliament. Summoning and case papers should be made available to all
1705 students at least 7 days before the meeting. Electronic decisions are the exclusion of this statute cf. §3-
1706 10.

1707
1708 The provision that the summoning and case papers need to be made available for all students in the
1709 first paragraph entails that they need to be translated to English. If there is uncertainty about the
1710 translation, the Norwegian version will be the basis for understanding. Further specification is outlined
1711 in the instructions for the Student Parliament.

1712
1713 All students with a valid semester registration have the right to send in cases to the Student Parliament.
1714 This must be done at the latest 14 days before the meeting if the case is to be handled. This provision
1715 does not count for cases to be handled under "other." Further specification is outlined in the
1716 instructions for the Student Parliament. Extraordinary Student Parliaments is held if at least 3 members
1717 of the Student Board, at least 13 representatives from the Student Parliament, or at least 25 students
1718 desire it. Extraordinary Student Parliament is to be made known to the public at least 7 days before
1719 taking place, and should only handle the case(s) that were the reason for its summoning.

1720
1721 **§ 3-5 Representation at the**

1722 Representation at the Student Parliament

1723 The following people are required to attend Student Parliament, and are required to give a written
1724 notification before the meeting if they cannot attend:

- 1725 - The Student Parliament's Representatives
1726 - The Student Parliament's Student Board
1727 - The Student Parliament's organizational secretary
1728 - The Student Parliament's chairmen

1729
1730 At least one representative from the following organs must attend the meeting:

- 1731 - The Student Representative in the University Board
1732 - The Student Representative in the SiÅs board
1733 - The International Student Union (ISU)
1734 - The Control Committee

1735 All students at NMBU have the right to attend the Student Parliament.
1736

1737 **§ 3-6 Closing of a Meeting.**
1738 The Student Parliament's meetings are open. The Student Parliament can decide to close a meeting with
1739 a qualified majority from the representatives in attendance
1740 With the closing of a meeting, separate minutes will be recorded that are withheld from public
1741 disclosure.
1742

1743 **§ 3-7 Decision Validity**
1744 The Student Parliament can make valid decisions when at least 50% of the representatives are in
1745 attendance.
1746

1747 **§ 3-8 Voting rights and Voting**
1748 The Student Parliament's representatives have a voting right. If a main representative notifies of an
1749 absence, their appointed substitute has a voting right when in attendance. Decisions in the Student
1750 Parliament are normally made with a 50% majority. Decisions are made with hand raising, unless one
1751 representative asks for a written voting. With a voting tie, the Student Parliament can take a new vote.
1752 With a continued tie after a second voting, the case can be handled according to the proposed
1753 resolution.
1754

1755 **§3-9 Speaking and Proposal Rights**
1756 Everybody has a right to speak at Student parliament meetings. All students at NMBU has the right to
1757 propose cases at Student parliament meetings.
1758

1759 **§ 3-10 Electronic Voting**
1760 Electronic voting can be used to make decisions about single cases. Electronic voting is carried out in
1761 the method described in the instructions for electronic voting. The deadline to vote electronically is
1762 within 7 days.
1763

1764 Electronic voting cannot be used to vote on matters concerning the following:
1765 - Elections
1766 - Cases of mistrust
1767 - Changing to the Student Parliament's committee documents and instructions
1768 - Appointment of the student representatives to councils and committees
1769 - Other matters of considerable nature
1770

1771 Main Student Parliament Representatives have voting rights with electronic voting.
1772

1773 Electronic voting cannot take place if one or some student parliament representatives wish to handle
1774 the case at a normal student parliament before the deadline. The desire must be justified.
1775

1776 **§ 3-11 Position Resignation**
1777 The Student Parliament representatives automatically resign from their position in the Student
1778 Parliament when they are elected to the following organs:
1779 - The Student Parliament's Student Board
1780 - The University Board
1781 - The SiÅs Board
1782 - The Student Board of the Norwegian Student Organization
1783 - The Control Committee
1784

1785 Student Parliament representatives also resigns their positions automatically if they switch to another
1786 Faculty than the one they were elected to represent.
1787

1788 With position resignation, the position holder's deputy representative automatically inherits the
1789 position as a main representative.
1790

1791 Position resignation, a supplementary election will be conducted in accordance with § 5-5
1792
1793 **§3-12 Temporary Position Resignation**
1794 In the case of partiality, there will be a temporary place resignation. This means that the representative
1795 withdraws from their position in cases where it applies. In the case of temporary place resignation the
1796 deputy will take over cf. § 6-1

1797 **Chapter 4: The Student Parliament's Student Board**

1798 **§ 4-1 Powers and Functions**

1799 The Student Board (AU) carries out the Student Parliament's daily operations and represents the
1800 Student Parliament between meetings. AU can make decisions in urgent cases, cases that are delegated
1801 due to earlier decisions in the Student Parliament, and appoint people to non-decision making
1802 committees. AU makes proposals in all cases handled by the Student Parliament, with the exception of
1803 Elections.

1804
1805 **§ 4-2 Composition**
1806 The Student Parliament's Student Board shall consist of the following members:
1807 - President
1808 - AU member
1809 - AU member
1810
1811 The Student Board constitutes their areas of responsibility internally.
1812
1813 Working time and election periods are regulated according to functions § 5-1.
1814

1815 **§ 4-3 Decision Ability and Voting Ties**
1816 The Student Board can make valid decisions when at least four members are in attendance. With a
1817 voting tie in the Student Board, the president has a double vote.
1818

1819 **Chapter 5: Elections and Appointments**

1820 **§ 5-1 Eligibility for the Student Democracy**
1821 The overarching rule is that all Students at NMBU with a valid semester registration can run for
1822 positions in the Student Democracy. This applies unless otherwise specified.
1823

1824 **§ 5-2 Electronic Ballot Elections**

1825 a) Election of the Student Parliament's Student Board
1826 The Student Parliament's Student Board are elected through Electronic Ballot Voting, where all
1827 students with a valid semester registration have the right to vote. The Electronic Ballot Election take
1828 place in April every year. They hold their position for 1 year, between 1.7. until 30.6. Candidates who
1829 apply must be able to master Norwegian as a working language.
1830

1831 b) Election to the University Board
1832 Two student representatives are elected, one of each legal gender, with a deputy. They are chosen
1833 through an Electronic Ballot vote, where all students with a valid semester registration have the right to
1834 vote. The election takes place every year in April/May and in November. They hold the position for one
1835 year, from 01.07 to 30.06 for the spring election, and 01.01-31.12 for the fall election.
1836

1837 c) Elections to the Faculty Board
1838 Two student representatives, one of each legal gender, are elected with personal substitute to the seven
1839 Faculty Boards (FS). These are elected by electronic urn election, where all semester-registered
1840 students at the relevant faculty have the right to vote. A student only has the right to vote in one faculty
1841 board election. The Electronic Ballot election takes place every year in April / May and November. The
1842 position time for the elected is 1 year and lasts from 01.07. to 30.06 for the spring election, and 01.01-

31.12 for the autumn election. Candidates of a gender other than the representative who already sits on the board are eligible to stand for election at a given semester.

§ 5-3 Members of the Student Board

Members of the Student Parliament's Student Board, other than the president and vice president, are elected by the Student Parliament. The elections take place at the constituent student parliament. They hold the position for one year, between 1.1. until 31.12. The elections are carried out through written ballot voting and decided with an absolute majority. If none of the candidates receive an absolute majority, a new voting round will be conducted with the two candidates who received the most votes in the first round.

§ 5-4 Other elections and appointments conducted in the Student Parliament

The Student Parliament elects student representatives to central positions and committees at NMBU, to individual committees and to the board for student welfare organization. All elections are done by writing. In the case that only one candidate is running, they can be elected by acclamation, unless at least one representative wishes to have a written voting process.

With a tie in voting between two candidates, a new voting round will be held. With a continued tie after a new voting round, the decision will be made according to the proposed resolution. If there is no suggestion made the decision will be made by drawing lots. Those chosen in this paragraph have minute requirements to the Student Parliament.

Student Representatives that are not connected to the Student Welfare Organization in Ås (SiÅs) do not have voting rights for the representatives of The SiÅs Board.

§ 5-5 Supplementary Elections

Normally, a supplementary election will be held in the case of place resignation. Supplementary elections follow the same election rules as normal elections. This can be adjusted in cases of urgent votes, or other reasons in which it is appropriate.

Chapter 6: Impartiality

§ 6-1 Impartiality

For someone to be "partial" entails that there are circumstances that are likely to cause bias in the person's judgment. This can happen when a person is a part of a case or has strong personal consequences from the results of a case, or has close family with the previously mentioned.

In order to have good administrative practices, questions of partiality must be strict. This means that a lot must happen to name a representative partial. Those that are named partial must temporarily resign from the case, cf. § 3-12.

Cases of partiality are handled with a 50% majority voting from the relevant organ, and the person in question cannot vote. If more than one person in a case is questioned about partiality, none of the involved can partake in voting about their own or others' partiality, unless the organ is no longer a decision making organ in the case. In this case, all meeting members can participate.

Chapter 7: Mistrust

§ 7-1 Mistrust

Issues of mistrust can be brought up by Student Parliament representatives or other organs of the Student Democracy, and should be delivered to the Student Parliament's organizational secretary. When handling these issues at the student parliament, the one that the case is brought up against has the opportunity to present their own case.

§ 7-2 Ability to ask for a statement from the control committee

If cases where mistrust are brought forward, both parties can ask for a statement from the control committee in sufficient time before the case is handled.

§ 7-3 Issues of mistrust against the representatives chosen by the student parliament

With a 2/3 majority vote amongst representatives in attendance, the student parliament can decide that an officer is mistrusted, following statutes §§ 5-1 second paragraph, and 5-3. Those who are deemed distrusted must immediately resign as an appointee from the student parliament

§ 7-4 Issues of mistrust against the representatives chosen by Electronic Ballot Voting

With issues of mistrust against representatives chosen through electronic ballot voting after statutes §§ 5-2 a and b, it is handled first by the Student Parliament. If it is proposed by a qualified majority amongst representatives in attendance, it will be handled through an electronic ballot vote where all students with a valid semester registration have the right to vote. The approval of the mistrust requires at least a 50% majority of votes. Those who have cases of mistrust approved against them must resign immediately from their position.

Cases of mistrust cannot be taken against student representatives in the University Board, as it goes against *Lov om universiteter og høyskoler* § 9-8. (The laws for Universities and Higher schools)

Chapter 8: Documents

§ 8-1 Documents approved by Student Parliament

The following documents are to be approved by the Student Parliament:

- Statutes
- Program of Principles
- Political documents
- Decrees/Resolutions
- Economic regulations
- Plan of Action
- Budget
- Schedule
- Working instructions for the Control Committee
- Working Instructions for the Student Board.
- Instructions for the Rules of Procedure and Agenda.
- Instructions for Elections of the Student Board and other elections.

§ 8-1-1 Statutes

The statutes outrank all other management documents.

§ 8-1-2 Program of Principles

The Program of Principles determines the organization's ground principles and executive political priorities. The Program of Principles outranks the rest of the Student Parliament's politics.

The Program of Principles shall be treated every 5th year. The Student Parliament can choose to treat the Program of Principles at any time. The Program of Principles shall be treated in two student parliament meetings: with a discussion case in the first meeting and a decision case in the second meeting.

§ 8-1-3 Political platforms

Political platforms determine what the Student Parliament thinks of a certain topic. These shall not go against the Program of Principles, but outside of this, political platforms outrank the rest of the Student Parliament's politics. A document is valid for 5 years. Political platforms shall be processed in two student parliament meetings: with a discussion case in the first meeting, and a decision case in the second meeting.

1961	composition without approval from the Student Parliament.

1964	The Student Parliament can approve of other instructions as needed.

1967	Chapter 9: Dissolution of the Student Democracy at NMBU
1968	§ 9-1 Dissolution
1969	Dissolution of the Student Democracy at NMBU must be approved of with a qualified majority amongst
1970	present representatives for two consecutive student parliaments. The decision goes into effect after the
1971	second meeting is adjourned. Proposals for dissolution must be made at least 4 weeks before it is
1972	handled for the first time, and the first student parliament meeting that handles the case is to be an
1973	open meeting where all students at NMBU are called in.

1976	Merging of the Student Democracy at NMBU with other student democracies must be approved of with

1982	The Student Democracy at NMBU is a member of the Norwegian student organization (NSO).

1987	§ 11-1 Submitting of Amendment Proposals
1988	Proposals for amendments of these statutes should be taken to the Student Parliament's Student Board

1992	§ 11-2 Decisions and Effectiveness

Purpose of the instruction:

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This instruction provides an overall insight into the student councils' purpose, function and organization, and shall contribute to them being run equally across the faculties. It is indicative, and each faculty can adapt it to the local conditions. However, it is strongly encouraged that you follow it as closely as possible. The instruction shall be used in the training of new class representatives after the general meetings. The president and vice-president of each faculty are responsible for following up the instructions.

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The Student Council's vision:

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The Student Council's primary task is to organize the class representatives at the faculty level and safeguard the students' rights and interests at the faculty. The Student Council is an arena for communication and cooperation between class representatives in various councils / committees and across fields of study. The Student Council shall contribute to good communication between the students and staff at its faculty.

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The Student Council's main tasks:

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- Be an arena for discussion about local and central issues concerning the students at the faculty.

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- To promote the students' interests in all relevant councils and committees at the faculty.

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- All members of the student council are responsible for informing the student council about important matters that are discussed in their councils / committees if there is no exemption from the duty of confidentiality.

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- Discuss issues that are promoted by the students at the faculty and promote them in the relevant council / committee.

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- Communicate important information about current issues to the students at the faculty.

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- The student councils will discuss student affairs and stay up to date on what is happening in the Student Democracy in general.

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- In collaboration with the Student Parliament's Student Board (AU), ensure that new class representatives are introduced to work tasks and current issues in their new position.

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- The Student Council and AU are responsible for ensuring that all members of the Student Council agree with these instructions, as well as other documents that are central to the performance of their duties.

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- The Student Council shall follow up the adopted Annual Wheel and Date Plan for the Student Parliament and set up its activities based on these.

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- Conduct a faculty general meeting once a semester.

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- The Student Council shall contribute to the Student Council in particular, and the Student Democracy in general being visible on campus, especially during the buddy week.

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- The Student Council shall also be a social meeting place and is responsible for stimulating academic community for students at the faculty. Where relevant, the student council has the overall responsibility for academic homes.

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- The Student Councils shall find student representatives to all positions in committees that where not allocated at the respective general assemblies. In regard to representatives that give notice in the middle of a term, where there is no substitute for the position, the same rule applies. These representatives shall be elected by simple majority at the Student Council meeting.

- 2083 your own cases in advance.
- 2084 • Promote relevant issues in its council / committee.
- 2085 • Promote relevant issues from its council / committee in the student council.

- 2092 • Has overall strategic responsibility.
- 2093 • Follows up the other class representatives

- 2096 • Attends student council dinners.
- 2097 • Follow up the mailbox.
- 2098 • Arranges a general meeting in consultation with the student council.
- 2099 • Member of the Student Management Team (SLT).
- 2100 • Has a regular dialogue with the faculty management
- 2101 • More specific information in "Instructions for the president and vice-president of the
- 2102 student council".

2103 Vice-president:

- 2104 • Has overall administrative responsibility.
- 2105 • Take the minutes during the student council meetings and makes the minutes available
- 2106 after the meetings.

- 2107 • Vice-president convenes meetings and writes minutes.
- 2108 • Update contact lists and make minutes and notices available on the Student Council's
- 2109 communication platform. The contact information shall be passed on to the faculty's
- 2110 administration.
- 2111 • Order rooms, food and drinks for the student council meetings.
- 2112 • Overall responsibility for the promotion of the Student Council. Sits in the working
- 2113 group for the promotion of Student Democracy.
- 2114 • More specific information in "Instructions for the president and vice-president of the
- 2115 student council".

2116 Student Parliament representatives

- 2117 • Has a duty to attend student meetings (3 meetings per semester) and meets as a
- 2118 representative from his faculty.
- 2119 • To promote the Student Council's opinions at the Student Parliament.
- 2120 • Responsible for student affairs at the Student Council. It is encouraged that the ST
- 2121 representatives are the case presenters on these cases.
- 2122 • Attend the student council dinner
- 2123 • Participates in the Kickoff Conference in January-February.

2125 Faculty Board Representatives (FS) - *The Faculty Board is the faculty's highest organ. The faculty board is*

2126 *responsible for setting overall goals, priorities and strategies for the faculty.*

- 2127 • Has a duty to attend faculty board meetings (2 meetings per semester). Is responsible
- 2128 for calling in a substitute if they cannot attend.
- 2129 • Promotes students' opinions and views on issues that are discussed in FS.
- 2130 • Informs the student council about important matters that are not covered by
- 2131 confidentiality.

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2133 Representatives in the Faculty's study committee / teaching committee (SU / UU)

- 2134 • Has a duty to attend meetings in SU / UU (approx. 3-5 meetings in the semester). Is
- 2135 responsible for calling in a substitute if they cannot attend.
- 2136 • Promotes students' opinions and views on matters dealt with in (SU / UU).
- 2137 • Addresses issues in SU that are raised in the student council or by individual students.
- 2138 • Has a duty to report to the student council.

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2140 Representatives in the Faculty's Research Committee (FU)

- 2141 • Has a duty to attend meetings in FU (approx. 3-5 meetings in the semester). Is
- 2142 responsible for calling in a substitute if they cannot attend.
- 2143 • Promotes students' opinions and views on issues that are dealt with in FU.
- 2144 • Addresses issues in FU that are raised in the student council or by individual students.
- 2145 • Has a duty to report to the student council.

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2147 Representatives in the Faculty's recommendation committee - *The recommendation committee*

2148 *evaluates applicants for scientific positions. They review applications, conduct interviews and trial*

2149 *lectures, before sending a recommendation on the best candidate (s) to the recruitment committee.*

- 2150 • Has a duty to attend the recommendation committee. The number of meetings varies as
2151 needed. Is responsible for calling in a substitute.
- 2152 • Attends meetings, interviews and trial lectures on equal terms with the other members
2153 of the recommendation committee.
- 2154 • Informs the student council about important events that are not covered by
2155 confidentiality.

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2157 Representatives in the recruitment committee - *The recruitment committee hires for scientific positions*
2158 *on the recommendation of the nomination committee.*

- 2159 • Has a duty to attend the recruitment committee. The number of meetings varies as
2160 needed. Is responsible for calling in a substitute if needed.
- 2161 • Participates in discussions and decisions related to appointments to scientific positions,
2162 based on the recommendations from the recommendation committee.
- 2163 • Informs the student council about important events that are not covered by
2164 confidentiality.

2165 Representatives in the program council - *The program council evaluates and further develops the various*
2166 *study programs. There is one program council per study program.*

- 2169 • Has a duty to attend the program council. The number of meetings varies as needed. Is
2170 responsible for calling in a substitute.
- 2171 • Is responsible for collecting input for improvements to courses and study programs.
- 2172 • Has a duty to report to the Student Council.

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2174 Class representative

- 2175 • The main task is to convey important information from the Student Council to its class,
2176 and from the class to the Student Council. It can be done in chats, at Cava, by email or in
2177 class meetings.
- 2178 • Is a contact person for the students in their class and brings matters forward to the
2179 Student Council.
- 2180 • Is an important link between the student council and the students at the faculty.

2181 **Other**

- 2182 • The Student Council has a contact person in the Student Parliament's Student Board.

Resolution NMBU as a Children's Rights university

Knowledge from children

All children in Norway have knowledge about their experience from the system or service they are in and how they work. The Changefactory conducts systematic surveys for children from all over Norway. They collect experiences and advice from children about their meeting with kindergartens, schools, emergency services and the legal system. The answers that are repeated are summarized and collected as knowledge directly from children. The goal is that this knowledge is included when the systems are further developed, so that the systems made for children will be experienced as safe and useful for them. Knowledge from children contains descriptions of how kindergarten teachers, teachers, health workers, child welfare workers and others who meet children should be, for children to get sufficient learning and get good help. This knowledge describes how adults must act to make it safe for the children to talk openly about important things. The perspectives presented are based solely on experiences and advice from children who are in various systems and services.

The Convention on the Rights of the Child states that all children have four basic rights when you meet them, when actions are to be taken and decisions are made that will affect them.

- that the **best interests of the child** should be a fundamental consideration in all actions that affect children (BK article 3, Constitution §104),
- that the child has the **right to express himself/herself freely** about matters that affect the child (BK article 12, Constitution § 104)
- that the child has the **right to get information** in connection with the child having the right to express himself or herself (BK Article 12),
- and that the child has the right to privacy (BK article 16, The European Human Rights Convention (ECHR) Article 8, Constitution § 102).

The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child contains some basic procedural rights that apply to everyone under the age of 18. By systematically teaching students how to use these rights in practice can have great significance in the lives of many children. The rights protect children's legal certainty, and studies show that if the rights are followed in all circumstances that affects a child, the trust of the adults working in the services is maintained. This will not only contribute to the children gained confidence in the professionals of the future, but also give the students concrete tools they can use when they start working. Then we ensure that they follow Norwegian law. For the future students that will work with children, to be well equipped to meet this community group in their working life, it is crucial that NMBU systematically trains their students in what children themselves believe are good ways to be met in all systems and services which is made for them.

The Student Parliament at NMBU believes that:

- NMBU will become a children's rights university with focus on children's basic procedural rights according to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, in all fields of study that educate students to work with children.
- NMBU shall introduce knowledge directly from children in the curriculum in all relevant fields of study.

2241 Action Plan 2022

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2243 Plan of Action 2022

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Approved at Student Parliament 2, 07.03.2022

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This is the action plan for student democracy. It has been adopted by the Student Parliament and states what is desirable for the organization to prioritize working with in the coming year. It is assumed that continuous assessments are always made and there is an understanding that both needs can change and that unforeseen things can arise. In addition to the measures in the action plan, the daily operation of student democracy must be ensured. In the annual report from the Student Board, the various points in the action plan must be commented on so that Student Parliament is informed about where the process is and what assessments have been made. The action plan shall not contain policy but shall contain measures to increase impact of the Student Parliament's policy. The action plan is linked to the long-term strategy that applies from 2021-2023.

2257 Internationalization

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- Ensure that all international exchange students receive a dignified welcome at NMBU. In collaboration with SiT, Fadderuka, ISU, and ESN, work will be done to increase communication, information flow and integration at the start of studies.
- Work to ensure that foreign-language international students are included in all councils and committees at NMBU.
- Collaborate with SAIH on a campaign to highlight international issues and the creation of a new subject around Scholars at Risk.
- A workshop will be arranged with the Student Society and UKA to share good inclusion measures that can be used for inclusive events, and to build a supportive cross-culture in the student community.

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2269 Environment

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- Work to improve the traffic situation in Ås, primarily campus, with a focus on improved public transport, cyclists, and safety for pedestrians.
- The Student Democracy will challenge the principal to ask questions about a climate neutral NMBU for all students and employees.
- Be visible and contributing to issues concerning NMBU as a sustainability university and ensure that the Environmental Action Plan is followed up.
- Work to make SiÅs more sustainable, with a focus on better systems for reusing furniture

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2279 Student life

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- The Student Board shall work to ensure that all students who complete a degree at NMBU receive a dignified academic completion.
- Meetings will be regularly arranged for association leaders where topics such as inclusion, role understanding and responsibility are addressed, and experiences are exchanged.
- The Student Democracy will work to ensure that NMBU retains the mentoring settlement, which supports new students beyond the Buddy Week.
- The Student Democracy must work for good physical and mental health services for all students in Ås.

- In collaboration with SiÅs work to ensure that students gain a better understanding of what SiÅs is, what they do and how they are organized.
- Work for a good two-way integration of the VET students at campus Ås.
- The Student Democracy will follow up the position of Buddy General in its new form.
- Develop a mandate for the use of room UU117, the Thorvald and Thora room, as a common room for all students at NMBU.
- Work against loneliness and exclusion - further development of intranet pages for students.

Study quality

- The Student Democracy shall follow up the action plan for universal design and psychosocial study environment.
- Efforts will be made to create a pilot for special courses for union representatives (formerly AOS234).
- Efforts will be made to merit teachers at NMBU, where the students will be represented in the work.
- The Student Board will work for increased focus on interdisciplinarity and sustainability, including the establishment of interdisciplinary common subjects.
- A document for digitization at NMBU must be investigated.

The Student Democracy

- The working committee shall work to formalize and remunerate Student Council presidents, Student Council vice presidents as well as other committees at faculty level.
- The Student Board will work to get a fourth working committee member, in order to better cover responsibility for student welfare, follow-up and coordination with SiÅs, organizational follow-up, collaboration with associations and class representatives.
- Work to improve Student Democracy at the organizational level, so that there can be increased contact between class representatives and other members of the organization.
- Training of newly elected representatives shall be arranged after the general meetings each semester, under the auspices of the student councils.
- A regular exchange of experience between the Student Councils shall be maintained, including continuing the ?(hva star det på norsk her) , the Student Leadership Group.
- The Student Board shall arrange regular seminars with students in the University Board and in the Faculty Boards.
- During the Student Election each semester, a marketing campaign will be carried out with the aim of getting as many students as possible to use their right to vote.
- The Student Board shall co-operate with other student democracies on national student policy issues.
- The Student Board shall respond to relevant hearings that affect the University and College sector.
- The Student Parliament and the Student Councils shall be represented where the students are located and participate in relevant events under the auspices of Samfunnet and Fadderuka, such as debates and rebus.
- Social events must be arranged regularly for the Student Parliament.
- The marketing of the Student Democracy and the Student Parliament will be increased, and there will be a focus on building a common identity and brand.

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Research and innovation

- Make research groups and the academic environments at NMBU visible to students, primarily the Sustainability Arenas.
- Efforts will be made to make student innovation infrastructures visible and to improve resources related to research on campus.
- The Student Board will focus on increased working life relevance, nearby practical educations and student active research related to relevant councils and committees
