

Urban living

The capital of Nova Scotia, Halifax is the perfect university city. With a population of 420,000 it keeps a friendly, small-city vibe but boasts the amenities of a much larger centre.

The vibrant downtown and scenic waterfront are a quick 2-minute walk from the Sexton Campus, and 15 minutes from the main Studley Campus. With downtown's world-class theatres, restaurants, pubs, clubs, galleries, and boutiques watched over by the 18th-century Fort George atop Citadel Hill, Halifax is a fantastic mix of history and contemporary culture.

With its renowned arts scene, there are always numerous theatre performances, concerts, and exhibitions to choose from. And as the home of a professional basketball team (the Rainmen) and one of the best major-junior hockey teams in the country (the Mooseheads), the Halifax Metro Centre is the place to go to watch top sporting events.

Thanks to its temperate seaside location on the East Coast of Canada, Halifax offers opportunities for countless outdoor adventures. Hike the trails of 185-acre Point Pleasant Park right in the city, or head 15 minutes outside the city to explore the rugged coastline. Drive 20 minutes to join the surfers at Cow Bay (in summer and winter!) or carry on a bit further for some picturesque beaches.

Rural living

Our newest location, the Agricultural Campus, is found just outside Truro, about an hour from Halifax. The scenic town of 12,500 is known as the "Hub of Nova Scotia" thanks to its historic role as the junction of the railroads that crisscrossed the province. It's also at the end of the Minas Basin which feeds into the famous Bay of Fundy, boasting the highest tides in the world.

Spend an entire day exploring the 400-acre Victoria Park right in town, or feed your adventurous side by going tidal bore rafting on the Shubenacadie River (you have to experience it to believe it).

Academic excellence

Dalhousie offers more than 4,000 classes in over 180 degree programs—more than many large Canadian universities. Our Environment, Sustainability and Society program is one of only a few in North America, and the first in Canada. Our Faculty of Agriculture, about an hour outside of Halifax, is the only one east of Montreal. And Dal is the only university in North America to offer Costume Studies.

Every year Dalhousie conducts over \$149 million in funded research, and as a member of the U15 (Canada's top tier of researchintensive universities), we're affiliated with more than 40 research centres, institutes, and technical facilities around the world. But thanks to our size and close-knit nature, you enjoy one of the lowest student-professor ratios in Canada (15:1) and have access to top researchers, including 54 Canada Research Chairs.

Whether you're into music, theatre, art, sports, outdoor recreation, or protecting the environment, there's something at Dalhousie to meet your interests and expand your horizons.

Have you ever experienced a live hockey game? Or an authentic Native Canadian musical celebration? At Dalhousie you can cheer on our men's and women's varsity Tigers teams, and join in on our annual mawio'mi, a traditional Mi'kmaq gathering.

The Arts Centre is not only home to the Theatre and Music programs, but also houses the Dalhousie Art Gallery and three theatres. The largest, the Rebecca Cohn Auditorium, is the venue for Symphony Nova Scotia and many larger touring music, comedy, and theatrical shows. dal.ca/artscentre

Our two student pubs, the Grawood and the Grad House, are popular meeting places where you can take in open mic nights, coffee houses, trivia nights, and improv.

Want to work out, go for a swim, have a squash or badminton game, do some rock-climbing, play some intramural sports, or cheer on one of our teams? Our athletic and recreational facilities include Dalplex, Sexton Gym, Wickwire Field, along with outdoor tennis and beach volleyball courts in Halifax, and the Langille Athletic Centre on the Agricultural Campus. dal.ca/athletics

Our academic support services can assist you with academic advising, developing study skills, and providing academic accommodations for a disability or religious obligation. Costs of living

The average cost of living in Halifax for one academic year is approximately **\$12,000 CAD**. (Prices are subject to change.)

Living on campus

Living in residence as an exchange student is a great way to meet people and have all of Dalhousie's services and resources at your footstep.

There are 11 different residences in Halifax, spread between the main Studley and Carleton Campuses and the downtown Sexton Campus. They vary in size and style, but are all supported by a great team of professionals who will make your stay comfortable.

An hour away on the Agricultural Campus, there are three residences located just a few minutes walk from all the academic buildings and student services.

Please note that there is no space available in residence for exchange students who come to Dalhousie for the fall term only (September–December). If you are planning to come to Dalhousie for the winter term (January–April) or for a full academic year (September–April), please email residence@dal.ca for availability. dal.ca/residence

Living off campus

Dalhousie is perfectly situated in the middle of fantastic Halifax residential neighbourhoods with plenty of houses, flats, and apartments available for students to rent—everything from beautiful Victorian and Edwardian houses to modern apartment buildings. The Agricultural Campus is located just outside of Truro, which also offers various off-campus housing options.

Eligibility

You must satisfy the requirements of your home university and be nominated by your university to participate in an exchange at Dalhousie. You also need to find out if your university is an exchange partner with Dalhousie.

While at Dalhousie, you are required to take 9 credit hours (3 courses) per term. A standard full-time course load is 15 credit hours (5 courses), which is the approximate equivalent of 30 ECTS credits.

Some courses require previous knowledge in an area of study usually demonstrated through completing a specific course beforehand. You can request special permission to register in these courses and the instructor will evaluate your background on a case-by-case basis before granting permission.

Winter Term (January-April) October 1
Summer Term (May-August) March 1

Tuition fees If you are coming as an exchange student, you pay your tuition fees to your home university. There are some fees (e.g. health insurance, transit pass) that you will be responsible for paying at Dalhousie. If you are coming to Dalhousie on a study abroad program, you pay your tuition fees to Dalhousie for one or two terms.

Application process

Step 1: Get a letter of nomination from your home university

Applications received without a letter will not be accepted.

Step 2: Prepare your application package

- Read the application guidelines online (dal.ca/cometodal/apply) and fill out the Undergraduate Application Form or the Graduate Application Form if you plan to take graduate-level classes.
- Get original transcripts from any post-secondary institutions you have attended.

Step 3: Choose your courses

- To view a list of courses that are offered during your desired term of study, please visit our Academic Time table for class times and availability (dal.ca/timetable)
- If you're unsure about what classes are available to you, please email international.centre@dal.ca.
- Fill out the Course Selection Form online and save it as a PDF file.

Step 4: Submit your application

- Your home university must send your application and supporting documents electronically to international. centre@dal.ca. We no longer accept paper applications.

Step 5: Confirmation of enrolment and visa

- When you are admitted to Dalhousie, you will receive a confirmation by email and a welcome package by regular mail.
- Once you have your confirmation, you can apply for a temporary resident visa and/or a study permit if applicable. cic.gc.ca
